

Leading Age 2023 Legislative Agenda

Support Our Aging Population by Investing in Aging Services, Supports & Housing

LeadingAge Connecticut is advocating this session to ensure a secure future for Connecticut's aging services consumer. The future we envision offers a modernized aging services sector; one which delivers high-quality, person-centered longterm services and supports (LTSS) at every stage of the aging services continuum while also providing safe, affordable and supportive housing options for older adults.

Funding to Support the Demand for Quality Aging Services

A modernized aging services environment requires sustainable funding to meet the demand of an aging population and to match the needs of the aging services consumer.

- Fully fund the next two years of the three-year phase in of the new nursing home acuity-based rating system that began a phased in implementation on July 1, 2022.
- Establish a separate pool of new funding for the nursing home Quality Measure Payments to be implemented on July 1, 2023.
- Fund capital infrastructure improvements for skilled nursing facilities and recognize the importance of all costs associated with the provision of quality shelter, support and services provided to nursing home residents.
- Support increased Medicaid reimbursement rates for home health care and the Connecticut Home Care Program for Elders (CTHCPE) providers, in line with the HCBS ARPA Spending Plan and recommendations of the pending DSS rate study for CTHCPE services.
- Promote and expand access to adult day services as a viable community-based service option.

Action to Address the Workforce Crisis in Health Care

Every aging services provider is challenged by staffing shortages. Temporary staffing agencies are charging exorbitant prices, nursing homes are limiting admissions due to staffing challenges and recruitment efforts are challenging.

- Provide financial support for the recruitment and retention of quality health care staff.
- Expand the number of fingerprint scanning locations available to new hires required to undergo the state's centralized background check to make the locations more accessible to job candidates.
- Address the exploitative practices of temporary staffing agencies.
- **Expand education and training** opportunities so they are both accessible and affordable.
- **Explore a public relations campaign** to entice Connecticut residents to work in the aging services field.

Updating of Regulations, Programs and Senior Housing

An efficient and modernized aging services landscape of regulation, services and housing can empower providers to offer options in line with economic realities and the goals of Connecticut's LTSS Rebalancing Plan.

- Enable the Establishment of the Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE) to offer comprehensive LTSS to dual-eligible individuals in the community.
- Review rigid laws and regulations out of line with modern technology and the current workforce reality. This includes updating the nursing home wait list laws that currently require many outdated administrative functions, including a mandate that the list to be kept in a bound paper book.
- Seek options to develop more units of affordable senior housing.
